As the Christian Education Committee continues to live into the post COVID restrictions world, we evaluated our existing programs and dipped our toes into some new ones. This journey continues into 2023.

PYC provided 2 "drive through" luncheons right on the front steps of our Education Building and provided meals that were delivered by our Session Members and other willing volunteers. By the end of the year, when many of our congregants were ready to meet for lunch in Fellowship Hall, our teens provided both a Halloween and Christmas Luncheon, both of which served double duty as fellowship opportunities and fund-raisers for Christian Education including camp and our High School Mission Trip.

Our Adult Sunday School class met via Zoom before worship on Sunday mornings, Logos met on Wednesdays for our elementary school students and PYC on Sunday evenings. The first installment of The Thoughtful Christian was taught by Pastor Jeff on Thursday mornings for a 6-week stint and our children and youth helped to lead worship in various ways.

You may have noticed that instead of one big Christmas Pageant, our youth and children participated in the entirety of Advent during worship with reflections and skits. This model was so well received by both our youth and our congregation that we will likely follow the same model in 2023.

In an attempt to offer multi-generational experiences, our First Sundays program kicked off in October. This program meets once a month and begins with dinner. After we enjoy a meal together we split into classes for age appropriate devotions.

Our committee continues to grapple with identifying and then filling the educational and programmatic needs of Old Stone. During this time of transition, we pray that we can discern the will of God for our congregation as well as our congregation's role in spreading the gospel into our community.

Dr. Brennan Wood, Music Director

To the congregation of the Old Stone Presbyterian Church,

As we reflect on the year of 2022, we finally returned to a sense of normalcy in our lives and in our worship experiences. This year is my fourth year with Old Stone, but my first officially as Director of Music. I appreciate your confidence and support as we journeyed into this new chapter of Old Stone's history together.

The Old Stone Community has been known for its musical excellence in worship for many years and this past year was no different. Each Sunday, our Adult Choir helped lead worship by guiding our congregation through new and traditional hymns and providing each service with powerful anthems. Our choir is blessed with many talented individuals that also offered to provide instrumental additions to worship. Throughout the year, we had recorder, cello, trumpet, and various percussion instruments, all utilized during our worship services. In addition, Gary Williams arranged and composed music which was debuted for our Old Stone congregation. We are truly blessed, as you do not have this level of musicianship in every church community. In addition to our Adult Choir, the OSPC Bell Choir had several performances throughout the year, ringing during morning worship services, and joining the choir and youth on different occasions.

Our youth ministry is an integral part of Old Stone's mission and our youth's participation in the Music Ministry shined once again in 2022. Four members of our PYC offered musical selections during worship services and sang with the Adult Choir as well! Lawson Hamilton IV not only sings with our Adult Choir weekly, but also plays trumpet for numerous services and substituted on Organ several times throughout the year. Truly, it is a wonderful thing to see our youth so involved in our church community.

In 2022, our Music Ministry reached out beyond the doors of Old Stone and into the community. The Adult Choir traveled to Covington twice during the year to provide music. The first time was in February, as we gave tribute to our dear friend and long-time Organist of Old Stone, Bridgett Armentrout-Edwards. The choir sang beautifully at her funeral as we celebrated and remembered Bridgett's life. In August, the choir was invited to perform the Inaugural Concert for the Wrightsville Festival. Our previous Director of Music, Dr. Calvin McClinton, was instrumental in the creation of this festival and hoped that it would bring a source of togetherness for all who attended. The choir performed a 45 minute long concert, singing a variety of musical anthems, a piano/trumpet duet performed by Andrea Edge and Lawson Hamilton IV, and a four-handed piano duet as well. The concert was very well received, and the festival committee reached out with an invitation to return the following year. As we journeyed toward Advent and the close of the calendar year, the Old Stone Community Chorus and Orchestra assembled to begin rehearsing for a performance of Handel's Messiah. A group composed of 35 vocalists and 15 orchestra members gave glory to God through a

performance of the Part 1 of "The Messiah", plus the Hallelujah Chorus. A performance of this magnitude is no easy feat for any musical group and would not be possible without every member of the music department, worship team, and the Old Stone community.

As we look forward to 2023, the goal is to once again reach out in our congregation and community to spread the good news of our faith through music. Praise be to God!

We received a \$25,000 grant to update our sanctuary from the Peyton Foundation. The committee voted to replace the carpet with a red that is very similar to the carpet that is there. We need the Session to approve this motion.

The committee would like to replace the cushions that will cost about \$10,000. We will get bids if the Session approves the money from another fund.

A hemlock tree by our power box and the cemetery stones are in danger if the tree falls. Our tree company says the base is rotting and needs to be cut down. His estimate is \$3,500 to cut the tree and grind the stump. We request the Session to approve this motion.

We plan to make a detailed plan to maintain the church property this summer. Some painting and other small things need to be done.

2022 was another busy year for Old Stone. The Session met for eleven (11) Stated meetings; three (3) Called/Special meetings; one (1) Ordination and Installation Service, and three (3) Congregational meetings. The Session meetings were held in person and also onn Zoom for those individuals who still didn't feel comfortable meeting in a group.

Pastor Jeff conducted several Mini-Retreats for Session during the year, along with an Officer Training class.

In March, the Session and Congregation held the Annual meeting where the 2022 budget was presented and reports were presented by committees, the staff and programs/groups in the church.

In May, the Session met with five (5) members of the Confirmation class, where the confirmands each gave their Faith Statements, which was a very inspirational time for those in attendance. With these individuals, the future of Old Stone looks very promising.

At a Called meeting in July, the PNC presented a draft of the M.I.F. (Ministry Information Form) to Session for their approval. Once Session approved the M.I.F., it was forwarded to the Presbytery Committee on Ministry for approval and was then forwarded to Louisville, KY, where it is listed on the PC(USA) C.L.C. (Church Leadership Connection) website.

A congregational meeting was called for Sunday, November 27, 2022, for the purpose of electing officers. Those elected were: Session, Class of 2025: Renee Ahern, Amy Meadows, Ann Walker and Gary Williams; Trustees, Class of 2025: Carol Cales; and the 2023 Nominating Committee: Michael Meadows, Lynn Weikle, and Bill Satterfield. All of these individuals had agreed to serve and were unanimously elected to serve.

The Session continues to hold their monthly Stated meetings to conduct the regular business of the church, along with hearing reports from the Session committees.

During 2022, Old Stone Presbyterian Church welcomed three (3) new members and mourned the death of four (4) members.

Usher Teams and Openers and Closers that were in formation and specifically scheduled prior to Covid started back in June. Another mark of a welcomed return to "normal".

October 16th was the Greenbrier Military School and Greenbrier Women's College Sunday! Rev. Binder led the service with alumni from both schools participating. Andrea Edge was the accompanist. Lawson Hamilton played trumpet. Guest, Bobby Nicholas sang the Lord's Prayer.

Though outdoor temperatures were in the teens on Christmas Eve, the sanctuary was warm and aglow for candlelight service with an impressive 145 in attendance. Amy Kesterson's youth illuminated the walkways with luminaires made by Logos. They also greeted, ushered and provided readings. Children placed their shepherds, angels, animals and wisemen upon the manger scene. Rev. Binder and the choir led a service of lessons and carols.

Summary from the Board of Trustees

Trustees for year 2022:

John Wilson – Chair Shirley Runyon-Vice Chair Carol Cales – Secretary Gordon Campbell – Treasurer Herb Pearis

The purpose of the Trustees is to manage permanent trust funds, according to their terms, and properties for the best interests and purposes of the congregation.

- 1. Reviewed City Bank investment policy and portfolio performance returns. Engaged City to become more active in investment recommendations. Moved expiring funds to higher return government securities and reduced brokerage cash account balance to create additional investment funds generating higher interest rates.
- 2. Trustees withdrew \$5,000 from Mildred McClung Evans Scholarship Fund (GVCF) to support Christian education requests. Tuition reimbursement for an Old Stone member to attend Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary was approved for \$1,250.
- 3. The Trustees assumed responsibility for the insurance policies of the Church's property and casualty insurance coverage with our current provider; Insurance Board. OSPC Manual of Operations was updated to reflect this responsibility being transferred from Session to Trustees.

Committees

Community Action (Lou Ella Lewis, Mary Scarborough, Linda Hayes, and JoAnn Pearis) This committee is responsible for promoting the Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering in November and the Birthday Offering. We also provided birthday gifts and snacks for the residents of Greenbrier Health Center in March and items for shut-ins at both the Greenbrier Health Care Center and The Seasons in December.

Spiritual Enrichment (Linda Hayes) In addition to Linda Hayes providing a devotional message at our meetings, this committee supported a card ministry for our church members that are sick, lonely and have lost loved ones.

Together in Service (Pam Lewis and Becky Kelso) This committee selects a local mission to support for the year. No program was selected for this year.

Women's Retreats (Lynn Weikle and Becky Mahlburg) This year's retreat in May was a joint meeting of the Afternoon and Evening Circles. All women of the church and friends were

welcome. We presented the final bible study lesson and shared pictures, mementos and memories of important women in our lives.

Projects

Americana (Lynn Weikle, Brenda Jones and Jill Gwinn) - Our thrift store accepts clothing and household donations from the community and sorts/resells them to the community with 100% of the proceeds going to local organizations that assist those in need. We received a number of new volunteers to the program, and maintained Covid protocols for the first part of the year. Lynn Weikle and Debbie Taylor volunteered to maintain the exterior window flower baskets for the year. Volunteers participated in the Lewisburg Chocolate Festival in April by manning a booth by selling chocolate treats and working the thrift store on a busy Saturday, and working with the Fellowship Committee to provide sweets for sale at the annual T.O.O.T. in October.

Gwen's Meals (Betty Dempsey, Arlen Myers and Linda Hayes) - This program provides bereavement meals for funerals or memorial services and provides meals quarterly for The Shepherd Center to be delivered through their Faith in Action Program. Arlen Myers, committee head, moved out of the area after a long period of service. She was awarded an Honorary Life Membership Award, which included a pin and certificate. Nancy Greenstreet and Ann Walker volunteered to prepare the meat for future meals.

Flowers (Betty Dempsey, Pam Lewis and Megan Kirkham) - Provide and care for flowers in sanctuary. Lynn Weikle and Lou Ella Lewis volunteered to divide flowers from the Sunday flower arrangements in the sanctuary that are not already dedicated and deliver to members of our church community.

McCormick House (Amy Brown) - We provided Christmas gifts for each of these young ladies. Despite our need to stay safe and not meet in person, we have continued to support the McCormick House.

Scholarships (Betty Dempsey) - Providing local scholarships to the New River Technical College and Old Stone Preschool. Our plan is to sponsor one student for the first semester of 2022 and possibly a second student for the second semester. Our funding will be determined after we investigate the "Free Tuition" policy at New River.

S.T.A.I.R. Tutoring (Debbie Taylor) - This project provides a tutoring service with second grade students that are struggling with reading during the school year. The program was approved by the school district and tutoring for seven students resumed in February 2022, in a new location on the 3rd floor. (*"S.T.A.I.R." is the abbreviation for <u>Start the Adventure in Reading</u>)*

Women's Fellowship - The Women's Fellowship members sent Easter and Christmas greetings to all members of our congregation. We also helped the Fellowship Committee and youth of the

church with a Carry-Out Luncheon in March by providing hot chili and cookies for the congregation.

Comfort Outreach (Amy Brown) - We were able to resume our monthly meetings with the Greenbrier Health Care Center. At these visits, we visited with the jokes. We also provided sweet treats to residents at Lewisburg Manor in March to help celebrate birthdays.

More than Mortar - We held this event in August showcasing to the congregation all the committee work that is done by volunteers. The Presbyterian Women sponsored tables highlighting our work with The Americana and S.T.A.I.R. tutoring.

Jennifer Runyon, Outreach Committee

The OSPC Outreach committee was formed in 2017. In February 2022, Jennifer Runyon took over as Outreach Chair. For 2021, Outreach was a committee of the whole of Session.

Food Locker

The Lewisburg - Fairlea Food Locker is housed in Old Stone's Fellowship Hall. The Food Locker also uses the Church's tax ID number. Bill and Gloria Martin are the coordinators and have a wonderful team of volunteers. Distribution takes place the third Saturday of every month. Participating churches take turns monthly helping deliver to Lewisburg Manor, Tabor Towers and Morgan Manor, which are residences for elderly and disabled members of our community.

Each year, including 2022, Old Stone volunteers for the deliveries in March and November. Molly McMillon organizes the volunteers for Old Stone.

Reach Out and Read

Reach Out and Read's mission is closely aligned to Old Stone's rich history in education.

With 6,000 program sites across the country, Reach Out and Read, a 501 (c) 3, serves children in all 50 states across urban, suburban, and rural communities. Reach out and Read is the only national pediatric literacy model endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics. The Robert C. Byrd Clinic (RCB) is a partner site location for the program. Old Stone funds the purchase of age appropriate books that are then delivered to the Robert C. Byrd Clinic. These books are distributed by RCB during well child visits at the RCB for children aged 6 months – 5 years old. The project is coordinated by Sue Gurley and Jenifer Huffman.

Phillip Fife Scholarship

The committee selected Ashleigh Darnell, a graduate of Greenbrier East High School, as the recipient of the Philip Fife Scholarship. Before graduating high school, Ashleigh was very active at Greenbrier Valley Theatre. The \$1,000 scholarship is a great help for students in our community as they begin their college education. The funds are paid directly to the school of the recipient's choice and can be used toward tuition or books. As a reminder, the scholarship is not endowed and is supported each year with annual giving from church members.

Davis Stuart

Old Stone collects a special offering for Davis Stuart each year on Christmas Eve. On December 24, 2022, \$1,193 was collected. We also received an additional \$500 donation during our January 8, 2023 worship service, which brings our total donations to Davis Stuart to \$1,693.00 These funds have been provided to Davis Stuart.

Communities in School Christmas Angel Tree Project



- Old Stone once again hosted an Angel Tree for CISGC in 2022
 In 2022, the Angel tree had 15 ornaments, which were all sponsored in a brief period of time.
- Based on funds raised in 2021 for CISGC, and a conversation with then Treasurer Scott McClelland, it was decided to use the remaining funds to provide 76 Breakfast Bags – which also included an invitation to Christmas Eve Service – to the families participating in CISGC Angel Tree program.
- Efforts are underway to determine the dollar amount of funds raised in 2022 that are remaining. Once determined, per the program's announcement, these funds will be sent to CISGC via check

United Way's WV211 Program

- Support from our sponsoring churches accounted for 15% of our cash budget
- Support from community businesses and organizations accounted for 8% of our cash budget
- Support from foundations accounted for 9% of our cash budget
- Support from a grant accounted for 17% of our cash budget
- Support from individuals accounted for 48% of our cash budget
- We held one fundraiser, a raffle of a Mountaineer Blanket which accounted for 2% of our cash budget
- Food donations from individuals and community organizations provided random food items which we placed on our "free table" where those who come to the Fellowship Hall can select a variety of items to take home
- We have a couple who provide a significant amount of food for the "free table" where those who come to the Fellowship Hall can select a number of items, as well as one beef which was processed into hamburger which lasted for approximately 3 months
- Kroger donated a large amount of peanut butter which lasted for approximately 3 months
- Individuals and groups have provided paper, hygiene and cleaning products which are not available on the TEFAP or Food Stamp Programs
- Each month the Humane Society provides pet food at the Fellowship Hall for those who have animals at home

Services Provided:

- The following gives an idea of how many families are served in each period listed: In 2020 we provided 3,352 bags of groceries to 2,412 families with 3,856 people In 2021 we provided 2,825 bags of groceries to 2,024 families with 3,139 people In 2022 we provided 2,907 bags of groceries to 1,973 families with 2,907 people Through February we have distributed 416 bags of food to 308 families with 464 people
- For Thanksgiving and Christmas we gave each family a \$20.00 gift card from Cornerstone IGA so they could select some food for each holiday
